

Presidents Message

Greetings Fellow Members,

This contribution will be different from the previous ones as there has been some significant changes in our Management Team here at the club. We want to start the update process and share some of what you can expect as we move forward.

Late last year the executive moved forward with a recommendation to seek some 3rd party consultation regarding our overall structures. This was primarily focused on the management structure but also included some insights on the governance model of the Board. It became clear through this process that a key change in our structure was to separate the General Manager role from the Superintendent role so that there would be two distinct positions. As we brainstormed and dreamt a little about this change our consultant led us to think of ways in which other positions could be reframed or changed. This led to

the folding in of the Business Manager position with the General Manager role. It also enabled us to envision the Superintendent as having a greater responsibility over the buildings and infrastructure of the Club. Part of the process was to come up with job descriptions that incorporate these changes and to identify key competencies that will be necessary for the new hires to possess.

Since we've completed part of one of this new way forward we've also started a conversation with recruitment firm that has worked with other NSGA clubs. Our goal is to have that recruitment, hiring, and on boarding process completed by the end of our 2021 season. Once that new person is in place we'll start a process to hire a new superintendent. This will also need to be achieved quickly as they will need to be in place in advance of the 2022 season.

While these changes are being made the Board will start to look at our governance model and by-laws to see what further changes need to be made. Part of what we hope will change is not only some positions, but also some of the culture. The changes we have undertaken are a bold step forward as we look at the identity of the Club, how different layers of our structure work and work well together, and at the end of the day how the Management Team can effect change that will enhance the member and guest experience of our spectacular seaside golf course.

I wish to say again how grateful we are to our previous GM Dave MacMillan for getting us to this point and to Philip Chandler who has stayed on to help in the transition. I also want to thank the remaining Management Team as well as the senior staff in all departments for helping make this transition smooth. They have already gone above and beyond which speaks to their professionalism and desire to have the Club succeed. Temporarily the Executive Committee has filled in some gaps and is helping facilitate in the transition. We do this with the same desire to see this process succeed but will work diligently to ensure that proper management positions are filled in a timely manner.

There will be more to disclose and respond to our August 25th AGM which will be held via Zoom. Again we can be reached at executive@chestergolfclub.ca

Ball in Penalty Area - Relief options

Putting Green -Much kinder place to be with new rules

There were significant changes made in the new golf rules as to what is allowed on the putting green. One change we have all become familiar with is leaving the flag stick in the hole when we putt. Covid rules required us to leave it in but now that is no longer the case. It is at the players discretion as to whether they want to leave the flag in or take it out. I have heard some discussion that all players in the group must agree whether to leave it in or take it out - this is not the case it is an individual decision.

The second major change was that you can repair damage on the putting green. Damage on the putting green is defined to include all types of damage (such as ball-marks, shoe damage, indentations from a club or flagstick, animal damage, etc.) exceptions are aeration holes, natural surface imperfections or natural wear of the hole.

Another favorable rule introduced for the putting green is if your ball or ball marker is moved by accident there is no penalty as long as you replace the ball. So, if by accident you drop your club on your ball, kick it or are taking a practise swing and hit your ball as long as you replace it no penalty. This also applies to your playing partners if they move your ball or ball marker by accident. This is only on the putting green if you move your ball accidently off the green unless it is during a search for the ball it is a one stroke penalty as long as you replace it (two strokes if you do not replace it). However, an important rule to remember is if your ball is moved by natural forces (like wind) on the putting green and you have not yet lifted, marked and replaced your ball you must play the ball from its new location. If you have lifted, marked and

One final rule to know is when the ball is played from the putting green and accidentally hits a person (not attending flag stick), an animal, or movable obstruction (like flag stick, clubs etc. laying on the ground), or another ball in motion the ball must be replaced on its original spot and there is no penalty. If you hit the person attending the flag stick or the flag stick while in the hole you play the ball from its new location (no penalty)

replaced your ball and it moves from natural forces

you replace your ball to its original location.

An exception to this rule is If a player's ball in motion hits another ball at rest on the putting green and both balls were on the putting green before the stroke the player making the shot gets a two-stroke penalty. The ball that was hit is replaced and the player plays their ball from its new location. It is the responsibility of the player making the shot to

ask for balls to be marked if there is a chance they may be hit.

Knowing the rules of golf can be an advantage.
